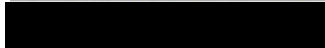

**Option 1: New Monument Design**

As per sketch, demo and haul off previous sign using a demo hammer and a dump trailer. Dig 2'X2'X14' long trench using a shovel. Dig out 2 2'X2'X1' boxes using a shovel. Punch two piers 1'X5' using a skid steer with an auger attachment. Haul off dirt using a dump trailer. Install #4 rebar cage throughout piers and trench and pour concrete of at least 3500 PSI leaving rebar stub ups on every cell on the piers and every 16" O.C. throughout the beam. Tie in a masonry block core throughout columns and center of the sign using a type S mortar and slush concrete of at least 3500 psi. Install galvanized wall ties throughout the coursing. Tie in anchors and stone per sketch design using a custom blended mortar of reasonable color match. Set 7"X3'X4" custom ordered Heatherwood Estates cast stone signs with 8" lettering using a skid steer. Lay new custom ordered cast stone caps on top of columns. Cleanup and haul off rubble includes a return trip to wash new masonry, if necessary. Columns to be 2'X2'X5.5', and the sign to be 5' tall X 10' long X 20" wide.
